NAVY SHIP RUNS AGROUND AFTER LEAVING WEST AFRICAN PORT; NO INJURIES REPORTED

A U.S. Navy ship participating in a military exercise in the Gulf of Guinea ran aground last week as it was leaving a port in West Africa.

Expeditionary sea base USS Hershel "Woody" Williams got

stuck May 9 shortly after leaving Libreville, Gabon, U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa said May 10

The ship broke free at about 5 p.m., local time, May 9, at high tide, said Lt. Cmdr. Jason Tross, a spokesman for NAVEUR-AF. There were no injuries or major damage, Tross said.

The Navy did not say how far the ship had transited after leaving the port before running aground or if it was accompanied by a tugboat at the time. It also wasn't stated whether a pilot, often required to help a ship navigate ports, was on board

A pilot was aboard Woody Williams when it came into the port May 5. Two tugboats helped the ship, which is slightly shorter than an aircraft carrier in length, through the port and into a berthing.

The Navy said it wouldn't release further details due to an ongoing investigation.

The ship uses a hybrid crew of about 50 civilian mariners responsible for navigation and maintenance. About three civilians, including a navigator and lookout, typically man the bridge. The ship mostly relies on an automated system for navigation, which can be disengaged if needed.

Construction begins in Point Loma for military Child Development Center

by Mario Icari, NAVFAC Southwest SAN DIEGO - Naval Facilities Engineering Systems Command Southwest joined members from Naval Base Point Loma, Navy Region Southwest, and contracted partners from RA Burch to mark the start of construction for a child development center for Naval Base Point Loma May 10 here.

"It's truly a pleasure to be here with everyone to share our pride in military families and our unwavering support and commitment to the needs of our military children," said Naval Base Point Loma Commanding Officer Capt. Jeff Yackeren. "This endeavor is a result of the Navy's relentless efforts to expand child care facilities, reduce waiting lists, and streamline the child placement process to a goal of three months or less. The current waitlist, which fluctuates on a daily basis, stands at approximately 1,600 children. It is our aim to address this demand and provide timely childcare services to our military families."

The planned 35,987 square foot child development center project is a large classification design and construction project. The Child Development Center, when completed, is scheduled to provide childcare and development services for children in age groups of infants and pre-toddlers, toddlers, and pre-school and pre-kindergarten. The NBPL Child Development Center was designed to have adequate space for children between six weeks and 5 years of age

This project was designed to provide an essential facility offering military personnel and authorized civilians and their families with full time, quality childcare and development for 292 children. This project is in support of and in addition to the existing Patrick Wade Child Development Center which is located less than one mile northwest of the proposed site.

The Child Development at Naval Base Point Loma ensures the continuity of care for service members. This project provides a new code compliant Child Development Center and is centrally located to serve the San Diego metropolitan region. The construction site is in close proximity to Interstate 5 and 8 freeways, which makes the facility easily accessible for child drop-off and pick-up.

Retired special warfare commander lauds value of strong allied relationships

Former leader of U.S. Special Operations Command and retired Navy four-star admiral William H. McRaven discussed the value of developing and maintaining strong relationships within the international special warfare community during a fireside chat May 9 at the Special Operations Forces 2024 convention in Tampa, Fla.

During a one-hour interview led by veteran television investigative correspondent Catherine Herridge that covered a wide range of topics, McRaven consistently underscored the importance of having trust-based partnerships to facilitate communications among SOF organizations across the globe.

"It's personal relationships ... it's always about personal relationships," McRaven said, when asked about the key factors that make up a successful SOF organization.

"We used to talk about the War on Terror as a war about relationships. It was how ... we build relationships with our Iraqi partners, with our Afghan partners with our NATO partners and allies from around the world ... You've got to build that personal relationship because they've got to trust you, and you've got to trust them."

McRaven emphasized that a strong working relationship between SOF organizations can't be established without first having trust.

When it comes to building relationships and doing anything else beyond that - sharing intelligence, partnering on tactical missions - you've got to start with trust.

McRaven elaborated on the topic by saying that there is very little tolerance for violating such trust

"Trust is not ... 'three strikes and you're out'; trust is ... 'two strikes and you're out.' Because, if you build trust, and you once, the trust factor will hold for a little while," he said.

"But if you undermine your allies and your colleagues a second time, you're done."

When asked if there are challenges to establishing such trustful relationships in parts of the globe that don't share those same trust-based values, McRaven pushed back slightly, saying that militaries worldwide share the same values.

"I think, across the board, militaries have core values," he said.

"They understand the value of good order and discipline; they understand the value of the mission; they understand the value of doing things the right way; they understand how to make sure that you don't have collateral damage that really exceeds the nature of the mission."

For an example of SOF personnel from a variety of nations being able to come together and efficiently work as a unit, McRaven mentioned the SOF '24 capabilities demonstration that took place in the bay just outside of the convention center on May 8.

The demonstration - which simulated an attack on the Tampa Bay Convention Center by a notional, unnamed enemy - showcased U.S. SOF teams collaborating with SOF personnel from nine other nations.

"You can line up on the pier out here by the convention center; and their uniforms are all different, the color of their skin may be different, their religion may be different, their ethnicity may be different," McRaven said.

"But then, here, they're all kind of the same — and you can spot them coming a mile away. So, I do think relationships are built on trust." When asked about potential challenges to building strong, international SOF relationships, McRaven said inaction is the primary impediment.

"We know how to build the relationships; now we just have to do it," he said, adding that Socom and the various theater special operations commands around the globe need to consistently be building relationships in support of the combatant commander in the respective regions.

As the chat wound down, McRaven said that during times of relative peace when countries aren't sharing the battlefield together, it's crucial to be proactive in building relationships.

"Because - believe it or not - sooner or later you're going to find yourself on the battlefield again, in a place you've never heard of, at a fight you never thought would happen," McRaven said. "And if you haven't built these relationships ... then you're not going to be able to move as quickly and you're not going to be as successful.

"So, take whatever you learn this week, take it home, and then find ways to continue to build the relationship."

JUNIOR ENLISTED TO GET 20% PAY BUMP, E5S GET 13% MORE UNDER HOUSE PLAN

MILITARY TIMES - House lawmakers' plans to overhaul military pay tables next year would result in a nearly 20 percent basic salary boost for troops ranked E-4 and below and a substantial bump for E-5s as well.

Under plans unveiled May 13. House Armed Services Committee members next week will consider language in their annual defense authorization bill draft that includes highly revised military pay tables designed to bring all junior enlisted pay to at least \$30,000 a year.

Currently, some young enlisted service members can make as little as \$24,000 in basic pay, although that total does not include other compensation such as housing allowances and free health care

But both Republicans and Democrats on the panel have expressed concerns that enlisted troops' low base pay make it difficult for military recruiters to woo young adults away from civilian careers, where a \$15per-hour wage translates into just over \$30,000 a year in salary.

Last month, committee leaders announced a broad plan to boost all pay for all troops ranked E-4 and below by 15%, a move that would add several hundred dollars in monthly pay for those individuals.

However, specifics of the plan released this week show an even more generous base pay hike. Committee staffers confirmed

for the idea.

the 15 percent boost does not include a 4.5 percent increase planned for all troops, bringing the actual salary increase planned by the committee to 19.5 percent next year.

For an E-2 with two years of military service, that increase will mean about \$5,000 in extra pay next year. For an E-4 with four years of military service, it's almost \$7,500 more in

To ensure E-4s aren't getting paid more than E-5s, the pay table overhaul also includes increases for mid-career enlisted troops. Combined with the 4.5 percent across-the-board raise, some E-5s could see up to a 12.5 percent pay increase next year.

An E-5 with six years service can expect a pay boost of about \$4,300 next year under the house plan. An E-5 with eight years will get a \$3,500 raise

All other ranks would see the 4.5 percent pay increase.

But whether that plan can become law remains unclear

measure next week. House appropriators backed similar plans in their budget bills last year and have signaled ongoing support

But Defense Department officials have lobbied lawmakers to wait on the ideas until next year, when their ongoing review of military compensation issues is complete.

And senators - particularly those on the Senate Armed Services Committee, which is currently drafting its own version of the authorization bill — have deflected questions on the issue, saying they need to see what the total costs will be and how that fits into other military priorities.

House committee officials said the price tag for the pay raise and other compensation reforms — including increasing housing stipends and broadening eligibility for the military's Basic Needs Allowance — will cost about \$4.2 billion this year. Total military spending outlined in the authorization bill is nearly \$882 billion.

Even if the pay raise is signed into law later this year, appropriators will still need to pass budget language to supply funding for the higher

nounces significant changes to access **NEWS BRIEF** protocols for Army 365 services. With the maturation of remote capabilities and the introduction of more secure alternatives such as Azure Virtual Desktop and Hypori, the Army is prioritizing the safeguarding of sensitive information. During the initial deployment of Army 365 amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, access and downloads were permitted from webmail to ensure continuity of operations. However, recognizing the escalating sophistication of cyber-attacks, the Army is transitioning to more secure platforms like AVD, Hypori and future offerings like Intune Mobile Access Management. Effective June 1, 2024, the Network Enterprise Technology Command will begin blocking access to all Army 365 services, including webmail. https://www. armv.mil/article/276112/





Destroyer Halsey conducts freedom of navigation operations in the South China Sea

SOUTH CHINA SEA - On May 10, Navy destroyer Halsey (DDG 97) asserted navigational rights and freedoms in the South China Sea near the Paracel Islands, consistent with international Law.

At the conclusion of the operation, USS Halsey exited the excessive claim and continued operations in the South China Sea. This freedom of navigation operation, or FONOP, upheld the rights, freedoms, and lawful uses of the sea recognized in international law by challenging the restrictions on innocent passage imposed by the People's Republic of China (PRC), Taiwan, and Vietnam and also by challenging the PRC's claim to straight baselines enclosing the Paracel Islands.

Unlawful and sweeping maritime claims in the South China Sea pose a serious threat to the freedom of the seas, including the freedoms of navigation and overflight, free trade and unimpeded commerce, and freedom of economic opportunity for South China Sea littoral na-

es excessive maritime claims around the world regardless of the identity of the claimant. Customary international law reflected in the 1982 Law of the Sea Convention protects certain rights, freedoms and lawful uses of the sea enjoyed by all nations. The international community has an enduring role in preserving the freedom of the seas, which is critical to global security, stability, and prosperity.

The U.S. upholds freedom of navigation for all nations as a principle. As long as some countries continue to claim and assert limits on rights that exceed their authority under international law, the United States will continue to defend the

rights and freedoms of the sea guaranteed to all. No member of the international community should be intimidated or coerced into giving up their rights and

The PRC, Taiwan, and Vietnam each claim sovereignty over the Paracel Islands. In violation of international law, all three claimants require either permission or advance notification before a military vessel or warship engages in "innocent passage" through the territorial sea.

Under customary international law as reflected in the Law of the Sea Convention, the ships of all States – including their warships enjoy the right of innocent pass through the territorial sea. The unilateral imposition of any authorization or advancenotification requirement for innocent passage is unlawful. By engaging in innocent passage without giving prior notification to or asking permission from any of the claimants, the United States challenged these unlawful restrictions imposed by the PRC, Taiwan, and Vietnam. The United States demonstrated that innocent passage is not subject to such restrictions.

The United States also challenged the PRC's 1996 declaration of straight baselines encompassing the Paracel Islands. Regardless of which claimant has sovereignty over these islands. it is unlawful to draw straight baselines around the Paracel Islands in their entirety.

Customary international law as reflected in the Law of the Sea Convention is both clear and comprehensive regarding the circumstances under which States can depart from "normal" baselines. The PRC-claimed straight baselines violate customary international law reflected in Article 7 of the Law of the Sea Convention.

Furthermore, international law does not permit continental State, like the PRC, to establish baselines around entire dispersed island groups. With these baselines, the PRC has attempted to claim more internal waters, territorial sea, exclusive economic zone, and continental shelf than it is entitled to under international law.

U.S. forces operate in the South China Sea on a daily basis, as they have for more than a century. They routinely operate in close coordination with like-minded allies and partners that share our commitment to uphold a free and open international order that promotes security and prosperity.






Fleet Replenishment Oiler USNS Earl Warren (T-AO 207) delivered to Navy

ishment oilers and they age out of the fleet.



Returning to the big screen after his starring role in The Barbie Movie, Ryan Gosling stars in The Fall Guy - an action-packed tribute to stunt performers in the movies

Gosling plays the role of Colt Seavers — a stuntman who "gets blown up, shot, crashed, thrown through windows and dropped from the highest of heights, all for our entertainment. And now. fresh off an almost career-ending accident, this working-class hero has to track down a missing movie star, solve a conspiracy and try to win back the love of his life (Emily Blunt starring as Jody Moreno, director of the movie) while still doing his day job. What could possibly go right?"

The Fall Guy includes the movie industry's first ever film credit of Stunt Designer, received by Chris O'Hara, president of Stunts Unlimited, and who is renowned as a stunt coordinator and second unit director. The Stunt Designer moniker goes beyond the traditional title of Stunt Coordinator (an official Screen Actors Guild credit that is also recognized by the Directors Guild of America). This credit represents a new benchmark that accurately reflects "the highlevel artistic contribution of world-class Stunt Coordinators like O'Hara.

These are artists who do more than coordinate the logistics of stunts; they design and create "Stunt Designers are the creative architects behind fight scenes, high falls, and more, and deserve to be recognized for the creative leadership of their contributions," said David Leitch, director, blockbuster filmmaker and a former stunt coordinator.

The Fall Guy was originally a TV series from the '80s. It "was a reflection of that era. celebrat-

ing the cowboy spirit of stunt work," director David Leitch says. "Back then, stunts were about sheer toughness, fearlessness, and guts. While there were tricks of the trade, these stunts still came with a lot of pain.

My journey in the stunt world began during the transition from this old-school era to the modern era where stunt work began embracing new technologies and practices.

As I entered the industry, visual effects and special effects were starting to revolutionize the stunt world. Wire rigs, the removal of those wires via VFX and other innovations were transforming the way stunts were performed.

While shooting The Matrix, I had the opportunity to witness the cutting edge of technology and the collaborative efforts that were shaping the future of

For me, it was natural to embrace both sides of stunt performing—the old-school toughness and the evolving world of visual effects. So, now, with The Fall Guy, I'm paying tribute to my early career journey as a stunt performer.

While we incorporate some nods to the role of visual effects, the film maintains a raw and practical element in every stunt. With this film, we aimed to deliver action that was true to the spirit of the stunt community by incorporating techniques that have become somewhat of a lost art "

The cannon roll was a particularly spectacular stunt featured in The Fall Guy. "Stunt double Logan Holladay broke the Guinness World Record for cannon rolls in a car with eight and a half rolls.'

These days, sequences like the Alma/Colt chase sequence, in which a garbage truck dragged Ryan Gosling on a spinning bin through the streets of Sydney, Australia, included a thrilling scene on the iconic Sydney Harbour Bridge that "would normally be done with blue screen," but "the team decided to film the scene entirely practically" old school.

Another exciting stunt was a jaw-dropping 225-foot car jump, "performed by seasoned driver Logan Holladay in a specially designed vehicle, crafted for practical, in-camera authenticity that could handle such an extreme leap. At the apex of the jump, the truck was close to 80 feet in the air.

Other wild stunts included a boat jump, a high fall from a helicopter, numerous fights, fiery explosions and much, much more. Multiple costume variations were required "to address the complexity of action scenes.' Oh, and be sure to stick around for the credits to see a cameo that you will not want to miss. Thumbs up!

Widower's retirement stymied by Social Security's "WEP" and "GPO" rules

Dear Rusty: My wife passed away 4 years ago. I want to retire so called SSA and was told I can collect my own SS at 62, reduced by WEP. My wife's SS was greater than mine, but they said I do not qualify for hers at age 60 because of the GPO. This seems odd that I get zero for her, however I can collect mine at the two thirds reduction at 62. Is this true? This zero dollar amount places my retirement on hold for now. I was counting on her SS. Signed: Discouraged Widower

Dear Discouraged: The Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and the Government Pension Offset (GPO) are two of the most confusing (and unpopular) of Social Security's myriad rules. From the way you describe your conversation with the Social Security Administration, it doesn't appear to have concluded with you fully understanding how these provisions work, so allow me to elaborate.

WEP and GPO affect anyone who has a retirement pension from a federal, state, or local government agency which did not participate in Social Security, meaning neither the employee nor the employer paid into Social Security based on the employee's earnings. Obviously, you have such a pension, which means that WEP will reduce any Social Security retirement benefit you have earned from other employment where SS payroll taxes were withheld, and the GPO will affect any survivor benefit you are entitled to.

WEP affects only the SS retirement benefit you earned elsewhere; WEP does not affect any surviving spouse benefit you might be entitled to from your wife. Rather, it is the GPO which affects your survivor benefit, again because of your state retirement (called a "non-covered pension" - one earned without contributing to Social Security). The GPO will reduce any surviving spouse benefit you might be entitled to by 2/3rds of the amount of your "non-covered" state pension. Depending on the size of your state pension, that reduction may entirely eliminate your surviving spouse benefit from your wife

Under normal SS rules, a surviving spouse does not become eligible for survivor benefits until they reach age 60 (age 50 if disabled). Normally, a surviving spouse benefit claimed at age 60 is reduced by 28.5% and it is the GPO (not WEP) that will affect your survivor benefit whenever you claim it. However, even without GPO, your age 60 survivor benefit amount would be only 71.5% of the amount your wife was receiving (or entitled to receive) at her death. If you are already collecting your non-covered state pension when you claim your SS survivor benefit from your wife, then that reduced age 60 survivor benefit would be offset by 2/3rds of the amount of your state pension. And that (according to what Social Security told you) is what eliminated your age 60 eligibility for a surviving spouse benefit from your wife. If you don't claim it at 60 your survivor benefit will continue to grow until you reach your full retirement age (FRA) of 67, but if 2/3rds of your state pension is more than 100% of your SS survivor benefit, you still won't get any surviving spouse benefit from your wife's record.

A further consequence of your non-covered state pension is that the SS retirement benefit you earned elsewhere will be reduced by WEP. WEP will reduce, but cannot eliminate, your Social Security retirement benefit. The WEP formula is complex but, generally, your WEP-based Social Security retirement benefit will likely be roughly half of what you would get if you did not have a state "non-covered pension." You could claim your WEP-reduced SS retirement benefit as early as age 62 or, if financially feasible, delay longer to get a somewhat higher (but still reduced) amount.

Just FYI, your state employer had an obligation to fully inform you of the consequences of not contributing to Social Security while earning your state pension. It appears as though they may not have fulfilled that obligation.





Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences Brigade visits NMCSD

Following the tour, USUHS leadership met with Capt. Elizabeth Adriano, NMCSD's di-


